WHAT YOU WILL RECEIVE · V1.0 · PENDING FOUNDER SIGN-OFF

A Foundation review is a full ORVIA Threshold review, funded through the ORVIA Foundation rather than paid for by the applicant. The scope, the reviewer, the Founder sign-off and the standards applied are the same as for paid work — the only difference is who has paid for it.

The deliverable

1. Written scope agreed with the applicant

Same document as a paid engagement, minus commercial terms.

2. Named reviewer with a conflict statement on file

Assigned by the ORVIA Founder.

3. Full Threshold review deliverables

Chronology, findings, person-at-centre section, options, out-of-scope list.

4. Founder sign-off

Personal, named.

5. Anonymised learning (only with consent)

Foundation cases may inform Academy teaching where the applicant has said yes in writing.

How it moves

This service follows the ORVIA enquiry journey — every enquiry passes Gate One (suitability), then Gate Two (controlled onboarding) before any evidence is examined. See the How it works page on orvia.org.uk for the full flow.

Every issued document carries a named ORVIA reviewer, a Founder sign-off, a version number and a date. Findings are footnoted to the source material supplied to us.
